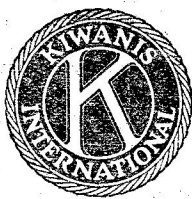

appoint a committee of past pres-  
idents to see what can be done to get  
all past presidents back into the club.

I expect the chairman of each  
committee to call a meeting of his  
group and make plans for what they  
expect to do this year. Each chairman  
should prepare a written statement  
and outline of his committee's plans  
for the year's work.
