With Nixon

WASHINGTON, D. C. President Nixon sat down Thursday night to exchange views with 10 farm

magazine editors from across the nation.

Ferdie J. Deering, editor and manager of The Farmer-Stockman of Okla-

homa City, was among them.

Topics discussed ranged from ways of maintaining high agricultural productivity to feed this nation's

growing population to American competitiveness in the world market. Response Pleasing

Deering said after session he had an opportunity to mention the proposed cloudseeding project designed to end the drought in the southern plains region and was pleased by the President's

response. Following the White House conference, the editors attended a dinner at the famous Blair House with Secretary of Agricul-ture Clifford J. Hardin as

host.

Undersecretary Phil J. Campbell and Dr. Paul McCracken, chairman of the President's Council of McCracken, chairman Economic Advisers, were present.

Talks Lengthy This proved to be another lengthy discussion of a broad range of agriculture problems, Deering said.

Concern was expressed about the ability of the U. S. to remain competitive in the world market due to this country's less favora-ble position in balance of payments and to inflation.

Dr. McCracken reviewed steps being taken by the administration to retard inflation. Secretary Hardin coserved that American agriculture has remained erre competitive than
