The alumni group also paid special recognition to numerous Distinguished Alums. These special guests were treated to a noon buffet in the Oklahoma Room and later introduced at the halftime of the football game.

In conjunction with the homecoming events, the ECU Alumni Association held its semi-annual meeting on Friday evening, Sept. 28, at Ross Meadows Stakes Place. The 1984 homecoming pareade, entitled "The Way We Were," drew a record number of entries. Nearly 100 bands, floats and other entrants paraded down Ada's Mains Street on the bright, beautiful autumn morning. What was estimated as the largest turnout since the '60s witnessed the Diamond Jubilee parade.

More than 300 alumni and friends of the university attended the first ever mid-day mixer in the Students Union ballroom, where former ECU students had the chance to visit with present and past East Central faculty and staff members.

Estimates at the post-game reception, held at the Holiday Inn, ran between 400 and 600 for the come-andgo affair. Turnout for the alumni/student dance, the evening's final event held at the National Guard Armory, was estimated at between 500-600.
